
51,444 married or **de facto residents** (30% of permanent residents)


STUDY DESIGN

Phase 1 semi-structured interviews 29 participants (purposive sampling) Phase 3 anonymous online survey 168 participants (volunteer sampling)

1990 Proposal

personal, civil, legal and consumer rights

dignity and respect


